The purpose of this committee is to simulate the role of international journalism within the context of diplomatic debate and global politics. Unlike traditional committees in a Model United Nations conference, members of the press committee do not represent countries or governments. Instead, they represent newspapers and international media outlets responsible for covering the debates that take place during the conference.

The press committee plays a fundamental role in ensuring transparency and providing information about the discussions happening in different committees. Through journalistic reports, articles, interviews, and analyses, the correspondents will document the development of debates, highlight important speeches, and present different perspectives on the issues discussed by the delegates.

Throughout the conference, members of the press will be expected to observe committee sessions, gather information from delegates, and produce written pieces that reflect the events taking place during the Model United Nations. The work of the press committee allows participants and observers to understand the debates from a journalistic point of view and helps simulate the real relationship between international organizations and the media.

II. Introduction

III. Regulations of the Press Committee

In international journalism, correspondents often work in foreign countries or in important political institutions such as international organizations, government headquarters, or areas experiencing conflict. Within the press committee of a Model United Nations conference, the role of the correspondent is simulated by the delegates representing different newspapers.
